At least 22 dead as a result of a violent rampage in Portapique, Nova Scotia: Canada's deadliest mass victimization case

The violence and bloodshed of a <u>devastating shooting spree</u> in Nova Scotia continued to emerge on Monday as the death toll increased to at least 22 victims and law enforcement continued working in 16 crime scenes across the province - while cautioning that the number of <u>victims in Canada's worst mass shooting</u> is expected to rise even further in the coming days. <u>Chief Superintendent Chris Leather</u> stated in a news conference on Monday that Several fires were lit at the crime scenes and one officer reported dead and another injured.

As a result of the pandemic, "victims are left with fewer and fewer places to turn." Subsequently, it is important to note that a decrease in calls does not equate to a decrease in violence. Executive Director of PATHS, Jo-Anne Dusel states that some people are staying home out of fear of catching COVID-19. As a result, accessing support can be extremely difficult with requirements to stay home with the abuser, leaving little opportunity to reach out for help.

The Revolutionary Guard 'mistakenly' shot down Flight 752 on January 8, 2020. The flight that was brought down by at least one Iranian surface-to-air missile shortly after takeoff from the Imam Khomeini International Airport tragically resulted in the death of 55 Canadian citizens. Canada continues to be one of many nations fighting to obtain compensation for the family members who lost their loved ones. Child sexual abuse expected to rise amid COVID-19 pandemic, experts say

<u>Alberta specialists</u> in the prevention of child sexual exploitation are anticipating a spike in cases in the months to come. COVID-19 has forced the closing of <u>the Little Warriors Be Brave Ranch</u> - a non-profit rehab facility near Edmonton for child sexual abuse survivors.

Members of staff will conduct online and telephone counselling for 25 teens and children who remain at the centre, along with some 75 other families across Canada.

In the past few weeks, an increasing number of prisoners detained on serious offences have been ordered to be released from detention by judges concerned about the spread of COVID-19 in jails across Canada.

One of such offenders was <u>Kaynadid Abshir</u>, who allegedly rented a silver Chrysler 200 four-door sedan and drove three gunmen to a Toronto residence on March 13 and waited until the target came home, followed him and shot him with nine-millimetre handguns. Another allegedly pistol-whipped and tasered two individuals in Ottawa over a drug debt. A third was allegedly involved in a Toronto strip mall shooting.
