Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)



IPV is Never the Victim's Fault

It can happen in any type of relationship - regardless of gender, age, culture, sexuality, or background.

It may include:

Emotional or psychological harm
Coercive control (forcing people to do
things they are unwilling to do)
Physical or sexual violence
Financial abuse
Isolation from community or supports

IPV is About Power & Control

Violence is a deliberate pattern -- not caused by anger, stress, or substances.

It may include:

Intimidation or threats
Surveillance or limiting independence
Controlling resources



IPV affects all people

Women

Disproportionately affected by IPV Representing 8 in 10 reported IPV cases Nearly 3 in 10 BIPOC women report lifetime IPV

Young Women (15-24)

29% faced IPV in the past year

People Living with Disabilities

55% experienced IPV 71% for 2SLGBTQI+ women living with disabilities

Men

1 in 5 police-reported IPV victims
Often underreported due to stigma

2SLGBTQI+ Individuals

LGBT+ women (67%) LGBT+ men (54%) Trans & gender-diverse (59%)

Indigenous

6 in 10 Indigenous women have experienced IPV (Higher among 2SLGBTQI+ Indigenous women) More likely to experience IPV due to systemic risk factors related to colonization





Why Leaving Can Be Complex

There are many barriers that may make leaving feel unsafe or complicated, such as:

Financial limitations
Fear of escalation
Concerns for children
Emotional or cultural ties
Lack of housing or support
